### SCBBBC

The second stop on the Scbbbc 2006 season was held on wonderful Lake Berryessa Saturday. 26 Anglers showed up on a cold brisk morning with one thought on their minds, to catch a lot of big bass! Blast off was at 5:25 and everyone hit the water. When it was time to weigh-in it was **Matt Cahill** with the best limit on the day of 10.77 lbs to claim first place. Matt stuck to capel cove and flipped his beaver around wood to catch his limit and claim first place. Matt also had 2nd big fish on the day of 2.83 lbs. Great job Matt. 2nd place on the day was **Travis Tarver** with a limit of 9.02 lbs. Travis wasn't giving away any secrets since he has another tournament coming up at Berryessa. 3rd place goes to reigning Angler of the Year **Carson Riley** with a nice limit of 8.93 lbs. 4th place was taken by **Russ Stansbury** with a weight of 8.81 lbs. Russ caught most of his fish on his Carolina rig. 5th place was **Mike Ayers** with a limit of 8.52 lbs. Mike caught his fish dragging a dart head and football jig in shallow flats. Topping out the top 6 in 6th place was **Steve Skaggs** with a limit of 8.14 lbs. Steve also used his Carolina rig to catch most of his fish. Big Fish of the tourney was brought in by **Dan Chester** with a nice 3.86 lb largemouth. Nice job Dan! Congratulations to everyone that got a check, great job.

Day two big fish honors went to **Nikita Martushev** with a fat 2.5 lb. Shasta spot.

Bass-n-Tubes Delta Region had seventeen guys show up on March 12th to brave the elements and fish the second 2006 tourney at Mildred Island. The weather was rotten all day with a constant wind and off and on rain. The bite was tough mostly but as always the delta kicked out some good fish. Mike Pierce found two of them over five pounds for a total weight of 10.88 lbs and the win. Mike reported that he got his fish on a crankbait and Senko. Mike Ayers had the day's big fish, a beautiful 6.34 pounder, and ended up with a total weight of 8.97 lbs for his three fish and the second place spot. It is still early in the season but Mike's consistent finishes this year have placed him firmly in the lead for the AOY race. In third position was Bill Sweatt with 4 fish for 7.56 lbs. Bill showed everybody how tough he is by forgetting his oars and working hard in the wind and delta currents with fin power only to place in the money.

BnT's second Travelers Region event for 2006 was another 2 day tourney held at Lake Berryessa. The first day started in usual 2006 BnT fashion with cold and rain greeting the fifteen anglers who showed up. At the end of the day **Robert Linden** took the early lead with 5 fish for 9.83 lbs. Rob also had the day one big fish of 3.13 lbs. **Chris Zaldain** was just over a pound out of the lead with 5 for 8.72 lbs. **Steve Coutts** made the trip to Berryessa from Redding and rounded out the top three for day one with 8.23 lbs. Day two dawned to better weather. **Mark Goodrich** had the big bag on day two on the strength of the days and the tourneys big fish an 8.12 lb -

-Berryessa hog. The big fish was moving up shallow to check out the bedding grounds as the fish was reported to be caught on a jig in just a couple feet of water near a flat. **Chris Zaldain** had a limit for 9.28 and took the win with 18.0 lbs. **Rob Linden** brought 6.36 lbs to the scale which was good enough for a second place finish with 16.19 lbs. **Chris Zelenka** rounded out the top three with a two day total of 16.17 lbs. The top three all reported catching mostly smallies throughout the day on Sunday to fill out their limits by tossing little Senkos, tubes, and worms on little points in 10-15ft of water.

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## **Tips Tricks & Mods**



The focus for this section in West Coast Kickboats is intended to be a place where kickboaters can share fishing tips and rigging tricks and mods that have made their kickboats into efficient fishing machines. If you have any advice to fellow kickboaters or want to show off how tricked out a kickboat can be and want to share how you did it. ### **Sight Fishing**

Spring time sight fishing, there is nothing like sneaking up on a big fish protecting its bed and watch them eat your bait. Sight fishing out of a tube has its advantages, but certainly a few disadvantages. The first problem a tuber encounters when trying to find the beds is getting a good enough angle to see the fish before they see you. If you are in a float tube you often will spook the fish before you see it, but you need to keep watching the fish and if they quickly return to their bed, it is a fish you can catch. If you spook a big fish while in the tube or rowing by in a kickboat, it is often best to keep moving, make a mental note of where the bed is and come back a little later. When you return stay back away from the bed, even if you can't see it you know where it is and can start blind

fishing it.

The best way to spot a bed while fishing out of a kickboat, is to be brave and stand up. Now it is very important that you are very careful while standing on a kickboat because it is not the most stable platform and you can easily fall in if you are not careful. I do not recommend doing this if you are in full waders, the water is still real cold, or you are by yourself. Each kickboat is different so it is difficult to say which is the best way to get up without throwing off the balance of the boat and fall in, but if you practice in a real calm shallow area you will get it down. Depending on what is comfortable you can use both oars or you can pull one oar out of the oar lock and use it as a paddle to slowly move around.

Standing on the kickboat is a great way to spot the beds and big, spooky females, but I highly recommend sitting back down before you start fishing because it is extremely hard to set the hook and play a fish while standing on the kickboat. Give it a try sometime and you will quickly understand why it is worth the risk of a little swimming in the pond.

## Making Shorties

While it is hard to think about the Summer time heat with all the stormy wind and rain that has been hitting Northern California this spring, but the heat wave is not too far away. If you try and stand up on your kickboat, I highly recommend making a pair of shorties because they will not fill up as bad as a full pair of waders. If you have an older pair of waders you should do yourself the favor and create a summer pair. Lay the waders flat on the floor. You want to then cut the neoprene with scissors a little bit below the hips like in the photo below. If you cut them too close to the knees water will get you wet when kicking.



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## Stick of the Month

### Mike Ayers

Mike Ayers has been on a tear lately. Mike has been fishing the SCBBBC tour events this year as well as competing in BNT's Delta Region events and has consistently been in the top five in every event he has fished this year.



Starting this year off in the SCBBBC events Mike placed second at Lake Sonoma and earned a fifth place at Lake Berryessa. Currently Ayers is in third place for Angler of the Year. Mike is a very diverse angler and has excelled at the BNT Delta Region events. The first tournament of the year, Mike placed third and he fished his way to second place at the Mildred Island tournament catching big fish along the way. Mike has taken an early lead in the Delta Region AOY race.

Folks the dude has been on fire, last weekend at a turkey shoot at a little body of water, Mike was able to pull out 18lbs of fish and run away with the win. In the past Mike has won two BnT Pro Opens, has made every TOC with Scbbbc since joining the club and both BnT Delta Region's TOC's. Last year Mike also made the 100% Team TOC Championship at Lake Shasta with good friend Bill Sweatt. "It's an honor to be this month hot stick. I just enjoy fishing from my kickboat and I have always thrived on competition my whole life. The peeps I've met in both clubs is one of the reason I'll be doing this for along time to come. Thanks Bill for letting me use your wife's round tube many years ago and taking me bassfishing."



## Tubing History (by Rich Caro)

There was a time when a two man Caravel inflatable raft equipped with a 3 pound lead weight as a Anchor and pair of Oars with BMX handle bar grips fastened on the end for better gripping was the floatation device of choice back in the day (1974) to pack into Lake Alsanjo. I was 11 years old and just starting to fish for large mouth bass. At that time you couldn't swim in Sanj do to submerged obstacles. All I knew how to fish with back then was a floating broken back Rapala and a Red Devil Spoon. The fish used to just eat them up like there was no tomorrow. I used an Olympic rod that was like a willow branch and a Mitchell 300 with some old 8 pound Stren. Stren was the line back then and it would cost you around \$5.00 for a 250-yard roll. I remember riding my GT skateboard to Thrifts Drug store after mowing a lawn or two just to buy some Stren and a Rapala.

My Mom or Dad would drive me to the end of Summerfield Rd and drop me off and they would give me a time that they would pick me up. If I was late I'd have to walk all the way home with my raft packed into my back pack with all my other gear, pump, 3 pound anchor, tackle box and my one Olympic rod. I was never late. Once in a while I would ask my Parents if I could spend the night at a friend's house and my friend would say the same to his parents and we would fish all night at Sanj. This was great back then as we would lose monsters at the boat and land real toads throughout the night. Then early one morning at around 1AM while floating Sanj in the Caravel we heard some voices in the fog. Those were the voices of Jeff Hampton and his buddy Steve. These guys where in these floating round objects call Belly Boats. I was then 13 years old and totally blown away by these guys. I asked them if they had caught any thing and Steve pulled on a stringer and lifted a 5-pound monster out of the water. This was the first five-pound fish I had ever seen back then. It looked like a small dog to me. I took a picture of his fish for them and he then released the monster. These guys were using some strange bait called spinner bait. They gave me one and showed me how to use it. I have been using them ever since.

So I finally get my first Belly Boat for my 13<sup>th</sup> birthday, it was a Mountain Trader that my parents bought for me at Lyles tackle. This round float tube had one storage pocket and no backrest. It had a camo pattern and was cool to float around in. I had rubber booted waders with ankle flippers. Ankle flippers were what we used back in the day until we realized diving fins worked better. When using ankle fins you can only move forward and if you got into any weeds you might be there for a while. The weeds would wrap around your ankle fins and then you were stuck. One of your fishing buddies with dive fins would have to come and pull you out. I only used the ankle fins for a few months before getting fins that moved me backwards like swim fins, but these fins laced onto my booted waders and they worked great and still do.

On my 18<sup>th</sup> birthday my brother bought me my first Bucks bag, it was a Hi and Dry float tube and a pair of Roland Martin Sunglasses. The first day on the water with my new shades was when my fishing buddies started calling me Roland Rich. Then I upgraded my wader with a fresh pair of 5 MM Hodgmen's and some Hippo swim fins. Now I was styling in a real float tube. I then watched the Bassmasters for the first time on TNN and was hooked. I started my subscription the first time I saw Ray Scott on TV. It was 1982 when I opened my first Bassmasters magazine. I have every magazine issued since, as I am now a life long member. After reading Bassmasters for two years and learning a few fishing tips and following the pro tour result I thought it would be cool to see a bunch of float tubers in the water at one time. Remember at this time you didn't see many float tubes on the water anywhere. So if you happened to be fishing and saw another tuber you would paddle over to them to check out there set up. So I made some phone calls and I was able to get 9 anglers to hike up to Alsanjo in the dark and meet in the middle of the lake to start the first of many SCBBBC tournaments.

Back then it only cost you \$11.00 plus one good lure or pack of worms, (Mann's, Mr. Twister, Grape flavored). We also let people use live bait back then. I figured that at that time several of my buddies liked using live minnows so why not allow them? Some purist anglers had problems with the live bait, but just for the record, live bait never won and never caught big fish. The first tournament was won by a guy named Mike who owned Mikes Pipe shop on Wilson St. in Santa Rosa Ca. We would weigh-in while still floating in the water. I decided to do this for the shock effect of seeing all these tubers in one area floating with all their gear. People walking by would always stop and ask the usual questions, are you wet? Are you touching the bottom? After the first tournament my buddies' suggested I put up flyers at the local tackle shops for the next tournament. This resulted in more Belly Boats showing up in the dark in the middle of Alsanjo. On my 9<sup>th</sup> tournament I had 19 round tubers on Sanj. Some of these guys were hard core anglers who knew what they were doing and they were kicking bass at every tournament. A few of these guys were Jimmy Reese, Dyane Rhodes and Beno Henie. These guys told me that we had enough anglers showing up every month to these tourneys to start a real bass fishing club / organization. So we did and we named this club the Sonoma County Belly Boat Bass Club. SCBBBC for short. This was the year of 1984.

*WCKB: What's your favorite thing about fishing from your kickboat?*

**Wendy:** I'm still young and like to stay in shape, rowing and kicking around in a kickboat is a great way to do that while enjoying fishing at the same time. Plus it is nice to jump in the water in a bathing suit in the summer.

*WCKB: What is your future tournament fishing plans.*

**Wendy:** I would enjoy sometime in the future doing couples tournaments with my boyfriend, or maybe one day doing some events as a non-boater.

*WCKB: Would you like to see more females in our sport?*

**Wendy:** No, I like all the attention to myself, just kidding. It would be great to see more women in the sport, I know there must be a lot of other women that enjoy fishing but may be intimidated to do it on a competitive level, but they shouldn't.

WCKB: *What's your best kickboat achievement thus far?*

**Wendy:** That's an easy one. My best kickboat achievement was last year at the SCBBBC Clear Lake Invitational. Although I started with the smallest day one weight, (1 fish for .98 lbs).
